Mount Nokogiri is a long mountain stretching in an east - west direction, at the border of the city of Futtsu with the town of Kyonan in the south of Tokyo and Chiba Prefecture. It is similar to the traditional Japanese saw of the same name. The saw toothed slopes are legacies of its former life as an Edo Period stone quarry. There is an observation deck that offers views to Tokyo Bay and Mt. Fuji when the weather permits. On its slopes, Nihon-ji is a Zen temple featuring stone Buddhist statues.

Transportation Example:

Hasune \rightarrow Otemachi ... Tokyo 8:00 \rightarrow (JR) \rightarrow 10:11 Hamakanaya ... Mt. Nokogiri \rightarrow (Ropeway) \rightarrow Mountain summit (Mita line ¥280, JR ¥1980, Cable: Round trip ¥950)

At the summit of Mt. Nokogiri is where Japan's oldest imperial temple is located. The temple is accessible by a 50 minute cable car ride or by road.



If you have time, we recommend a scenic ferry ride that crosses Tokyo BayKanaya Port - 40 min - Kurihama (Port Operates every hour).

Unfortunately, the ride to Shinagawa is non-stop. You cannot stop by Yokohama for dinner in the middle of the trip. However, you can plan the trip ahead by purchasing tickets up to four days in advance.
